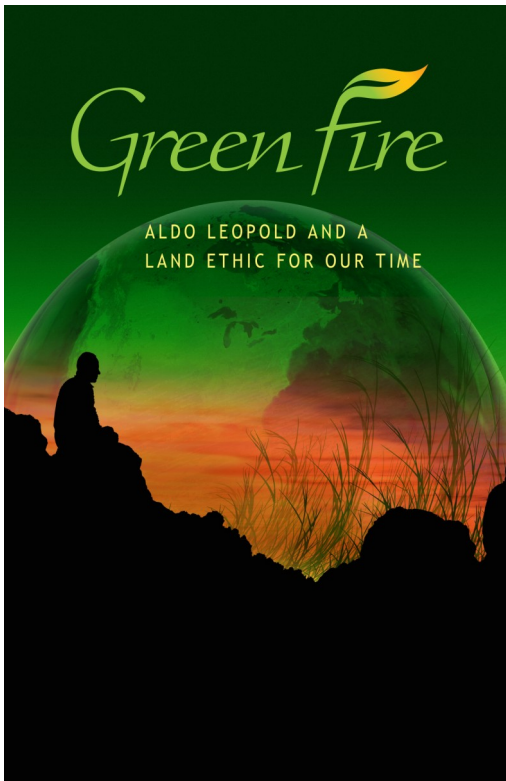


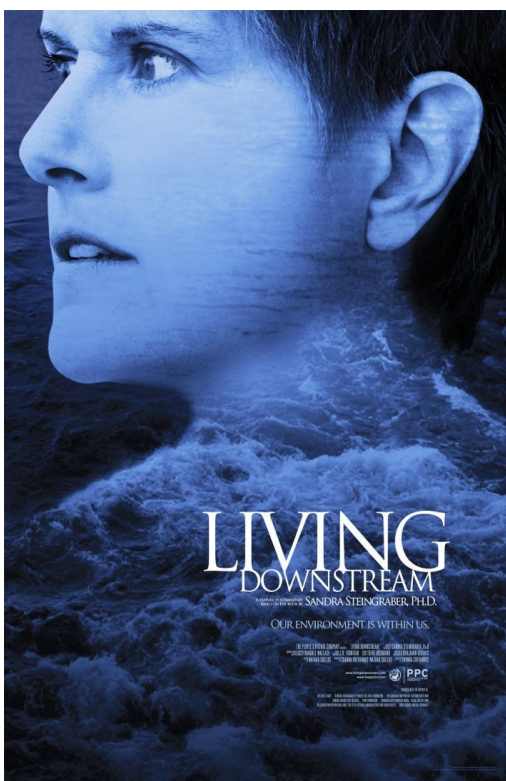

DETAILS: See the first full-length, high-definition documentary film ever made about legendary conservationist Aldo Leopold and his environmental legacy! *Green Fire* shares highlights from his extraordinary career, explaining how he shaped conservation and the modern environmental movement. It also illustrates how Leopold's vision of a community that cares about both people and land continues to inform and inspire people across the country and around the world, highlighting modern projects that put Leopold's land ethic in action in a multitude of ways.

DETAILS: The film closely follows the trajectory of Sandra Steingraber, biologist, cancer survivor, and Illinois native as she tracks the important progress of scientific investigation on environmental links to cancer and other health ailments. Several experts in the fields of toxicology and cancer research make appearances in the film, highlighting, their own findings on such pervasive chemicals such as atrazine, a widely used herbicide, and industrial compounds such as polychlorinated biphenyls (PCB's). Illuminating the connection between a healthy environment and human health.

It examines the imminent extinction of bluefin tuna, brought on by increasing western demand for sushi; the impact on marine life resulting in huge overpopulation of jellyfish; and the profound implications of a future world with no fish that would bring certain mass starvation. Filmed across the world – from the Straits of Gibraltar to the coasts of Senegal and Alaska to the Tokyo fish market – featuring top scientists, indigenous fishermen and fisheries enforcement officials, *The End of the Line* is a wake-up call to the world
